Letters recently received from Batavia mention, that a large and formidable fleet of Malay Proas were then investing the Straits of Banca, and that they attacked vessels of all nations indiscriminately. A Dutch packet vessel from Calcutta, bound to Batavia, fell in with this fleet, with whom she had a very severe consist, and with much dissiculty got clear of them.—We understand the Dutch are preparing a force sufficient to crush them.
