BOMBAY, Nov 18.

Accounts have reached the Presidency from Ceylon of a mutiny on board the brig Sully and Mary, Captain Duncan, from Calcutta, bound to the Mauritius. The mutineers, it seems, made a desperate attack upon the officers and passengers, during which both the Captain and Lieutenant Robinson, of the 4th Ceylon regiment, were dangerously wounded; they were, however, repulsed; when the ringleader, a Malay, jumped overboard, and the others were secured, the villain is supposed to have reached the shore near Butticaloa, where we trust he will be apprehended, and with his companions in iniquity suffer the just punishment of the law for so heinous a crime. In consequence of the mutiny, the Captain was obliged to put into Trincomalee.
