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## Malacca.

### NANNING.

By late accounts from Malacca we regret to learn that Mr. Anderson, the civilian lately appointed to the residency of Nanning, has fallen a victim to the jungle fever, caught during his residence in the newly acquired district. For the short period he held the office of resident, his endeavours to induce the natives to re-settle in the country were crowned with success, and the Malays were beginning to re-assume their former confidence in the government. We understand that a considerable quantity of arms have been voluntarily given up by them. Sickness having prevailed to a great extent amongst the European soldiers, and having proved fatal to several of them, the remainder were recalled to the town, nearly all in a bad state of health, and have been returned to Madras, we believe, on the Ganges. The two companies conveyed to Malacca by H.M.S. *Imogene*, were not permitted to land there, and the vessel "put about" on the following day on her return to Madras. No-doubt the voyage will prove beneficial to many of the soldiers!—*Sing. Chron. Aug. 16.*
