We have been informed, while the Bark Donna Carmelita was on her passage from Calcutta to this port, and laying becalmed off Polo Pisang in the evening of the 17th instant, that Captain Edward observed a very large prahu also laying there, but at some distance from his ship. The Captain did not think of paying any particular attention to the vicinity of the stranger. until about midnight his notice was attracted by the splash as of a boat well manned pulling very quickly towards the vessel. Some musketry loaded with ball were now order. ed oh deck, and ultimately discharged at her by way of intimidation, but without effecting that object. The prahu still continued to pull towards the vessel, and when close too some grape shot was discharged at her, and sheering off immediately aftermage must have been considerable da-Edwards, it is said, saw evers prahus in shore of him the series 1. but having other thoughts perhaps those of pirates, he apparently cared very little about them, knowing his own strength and vessels are not equally prepri la for even

an open attack, much less for any surprise they might receive during the night, and in that case one boat, such as came on the Carmelita, would have carried her at once.
