

The boats of the *Wolf* together with the gun-boats, which it will be remembered, immediately after the arrival of that vessel from her cruize along the East Coast of the Peninsula, had sailed in the same direction in prosecution of further enterprises against the pirates, returned to port the day before yesterday. The expedition sailed up the coast keeping a vigilant look out; as they proceeded and while cruizing about in the neighbourhood of Pulo Tingy they had for several days observed a number of small native boats dodging about the island, which awakened some suspicion, and Lieut. MACDONALD, the officer in command, having landed, they discovered in a secluded spot, a small Malay kampong, with upwards of 20 *sampans* drawn up on shore. He forthwith secured all the male inhabitants, 16 in number, and having taken them down to the beach, they were nearly all identified by the Cochin Chinese, who accompanied the boats, as parties engaged in the attack upon the Cochin Chinese tope brought in by the Steamer—and some of them are sworn to by one of the tope's people as having been the actual murderers of two of his comrades. Some trifling articles discovered in the huts were also identified by the Cochin Chinese as part of the plunder of their vessel. Fourteen

out of 16 men captured were brought here, and of that number eleven, we understand, are completely identified by the surviving crew of the tope. There is a report of a Siam Junk laden with a valuable cargo having been captured by the pirates and carried into the Island of Seantan—and the persevering and indefatigable *Wolfites* are, we hear, preparing once more to encounter the exposure and fatigue of another long cruize in the hopes of gaining some traces of her, and of the pirates by whom she has been taken.
