

By the arrival of the *Glasgow* during the week from Siam, we have received private advices of the 22d June, which state that that market for British imports was improving, and that Sugar was becoming scarce, and advancing in price, comprising all the additional particulars respecting the market which we possess since the publication of our last intelligence from the same quarter.

The *Glasgow* was the bearer of a missive from the His Siamese Majesty's prime minister to the local authorities here, respecting the two females from Sangora who had been mistaken for Mrs. BRESLEY and her attendant—and our correspondent seems to be of the same opinion with ourselves, that their being known and spoken of in Sangora as the wives of English Captains was the origin and sole cause of the inquiries which have been made by the friends of that lady, who he expresses himself satisfied never was in Sangora.

It seems that the junk which was attacked by the Illanoon pirates encountered by the Steamer *Diana*, was a Junk belonging to Siam. She was in the river off Bangkok, and a good many shot-holes in her hull bore witness to the manner in which she had been handled by the pirates.
