THE POLICE COURTS.

BOW-STREET.

On Thursday the steamer Uruguay arrived at Liverpool from Monte Video, having on board the remainder of the prisoners concerned in the murder of the captain and some of the crew of the Flowerly Land. Five of the desperadoes, with two witnesses, had already arrived at Southampton. The mutineers, it will be remembered, stabbed the captain, his brother, and the chief mate, and threw them overboard, and took possession of the ship. They subsequently killed the steward. The names of the prisoners who arrived on Thursday are *John Lyons*, a Malay; *Borcelia la Santo*, *Moratio Durano*, and *Francisco Paliroda*, Manillamen; and *Frank Power*, a Spaniard, we believe. All the prisoners are heavily ironed, with the exception of Power, who, it is stated, will appear as a witness against the others. Lyons, who is said to be the murderer of the captain, and who is wearing the murdered man's shoes, is ill. This prisoner after the mutiny took command of the ship, and seems to have been the ring-leader.

At a late period of the day a gentleman from the Treasury attended before Mr. Henry, the sitting magistrate, and stated that owing to the prisoners, who were conveyed to Liverpool, not having arrived in London, the case against the five men now in custody at Bow-street Police-station would not be gone into that day, but as the whole of the prisoners would be in London on Saturday (this day), Mr. Welaby, who is instructed by the Treasury to prosecute, will proceed with the case against the whole of the prisoners on the charge of murder and piracy.

The prisoners brought from Southampton will remain in custody at the Bow-street station, and on the arrival of the other prisoners they will be conveyed to the same place and brought up together before the magistrate this morning.
