**CARRIED AWAY BY A TIGER.**—At 9 o'clock a.m. on the 24th instant, a Malay, named Ningul, with four others, three males and one female, all Malays, left Campong Elari, which is situated on the right bank of the Sirangoon river, distant about a mile from the Sirangoon station No. 3, and entered the jungle to cut wood at a place called Sungie Siloo. Whilst they were engaged in cutting wood a tiger sprang out of the jungle, seized the man named Ningul, and was walking away with him. The others on seeing this gave chase, and pursued the tiger for about a mile, when the animal threw his victim down and ran away. The Malays on going to pick the man up found that life was extinct. The Duffadars of Stations Nos. 2 and 3 Sirangoon proceeded to Campong Elari to examine the body of deceased, when they observed that the neck was broken, and impressions of the tiger's claws visible on different parts of the body of deceased.—*Straits Times*, Sept. 7.
