THE MALAY RISING.

(THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCY.)

SINGAPORE, DEC. 22.

Intelligence received here from Perak announces the arrival of the British troops before Kintah, where Ismail and Maharaja Sela oppose them with a large force. Telegraphic communication has been established between Perak and the Cabut (P) River district. General Colborne has asked for reinforcements.

BOMBAY, DEC. 23.

The latest intelligence received here from Penang is of the 15th inst. General Colborne and Brigadier Ross were respectively progressing north and south of the Perak River. Ismail had gone to Pahang. He had obtained co-operation, and complications with other Malay states were probable. Particulars of the attack made on the 7th by a detachment of the 10th Regiment upon the stockade near Sungie Ujong state that the British forces were commanded by Lieutenants Hinxmans and Peyton. The stockade contained 400 Malays, who made a determined resistance; but the position was carried at the point of the bayonet. The British loss is given at 13 killed and 10 wounded, and the loss of the Malays at 21 killed and a considerable number wounded. Matters were considered serious. Anson remained at Malacca.
